Coin Lore

The 1892-3 Columbian Half Dollars

Columbian Half Dollars were our nation's first commemorative coin and are listed as such in "A Guide Book of U.S. Coins" which is more commonly known as "The Red Book." In conjunction with the 500th anniversary of Columbus's landing, the Columbian Exposition commenced in 1892 and remained in full swing into 1893. Charles Barber engraved the obverse, showing a bust of Columbus which was designed by one Olin Lewis Warner. The reverse, featuring a representation of Columbus's flagship, the Santa Maria, was engraved by George T. Morgan. These coins were sold for a dollar, each, at the exposition which was held in Chicago. These coins were then and still are legal tender for fifty cents.

Can you imagine the look on a cashier's face nowadays if you tried to spend one of these? Of course, it would be foolish to spend one of these. Presently, there is the equivalent of \$14 in silver in these coins, and the silver value is now causing the numismatic value of these to swell.

When buying so-called uncirculated specimens of this coin, look for signs of wear on the high spots, being Columbus's cheek and hair on the obverse, and the sails and globes on the reverse. Note that this U.S. coin has its date on the reverse ... good trivia question, huh?



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In this writer's humble opinion, no collection of U.S. type coins is complete without this historic and most artfully designed coin, resting within. In addition to their appeal to coin collectors, these halves are actively sought by those who collect memorabilia from the Columbian Exposition. A vast array of such collectibles exists for what many regard as this country's first world's fair.

By the way, one of these Columbian halves is among this month's prizes. Might you be the lucky winner?
