A YEAR SET - 1898 by Bill Groom

One of the many ways to collect coins is by forming year sets. Instead of seeking coins from every mint, a year set collector looks for one coin of each denomination. Of course, some years will prove more difficult to acquire than others. The year 1921 is a difficult year to assemble, primarily due to the scarcity and cost of the quarters; and, the two types of dollars produced that year. A year set for 1931 would consist of but three coins: cent, nickel and dime. A 1933 year set simply requires a Philadelphia or Denver cent and a San Francisco half dollar; maybe even a 1933 \$20 gold coin - if one can be found!



One of this month's prizes is an 1898 year set of minor coins. All coins are in good condition, having full separation of the lettering from the rims. Of course, an 1898 silver dollar would round out the set, and some gold coins would certainly spice up the year set. It all depends upon a collector's interest; and, the factor of affordability.

History contributes to much of the allure that old coins have for collectors. So, what was happening in 1898? Well, a cigar or a beer could generally be purchased for a nickel back then. On January 1, NY City annexed surrounding land, forming the five boroughs: Bronx, Manhattan, Queens, Staten Island and Brooklyn. The first automobile fatality on a public highway occurred in England on an electric car! War was declared against Spain, and Annie Oakley wrote a letter to President McKinley, offering a company of fifty women sharpshooters to help in the cause! The U.S. annexed the Hawaiian Islands.
