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Coin Lore

The Wealth of the South Tokens

Among my favorite Civil War tokens are the so-called *Wealth of the South* series. Although issued for the 1860 election year, these tokens have long been included in the Civil War series. A Cincinnati die sinker, Benjamin C. True, struck a variety of these "Confederate" tokens in addition to tokens that promoted candidates Abraham Lincoln, Stephen Douglas, John Bell and John Breckenridge that year. True's tokens were brass and slightly smaller than a quarter. Often, they were plated and appear silvery as such. Many were holed to be worn with a ribbon. Unlike most Civil War tokens that circulated as cent subtitues, True's tokens were keepsakes, to be worn, carried as pocket pieces or simply collected.





Many Civil War tokens display fine pictorials, but few can compare with the intricate design of True's *Wealth of the South* pieces. Higher grade pieces boast amazing detail. Note how the cannon resides at peaceful rest, stacked cannon balls nearby, beneath the graceful Palmetto tree. These tokens left no doubt in 1860 that the South stood ready to defend its wealth in "rice, tobacco, sugar, cotton" as illustrated on the token's reverse.

In today's market, worn and/or holed specimens of these *Wealth of the South* tokens sell in the \$300-\$500 range. Higher grade, unholed specimens will command twice that amount and more. Common Civil War tokens are presently selling in the \$20-\$50 range. Anyone interested in this series may Google the **Civil War Token Society** online. There's an informative website, and books on the subject can be gotten at reasonable cost.
