## Coin Lore

Never Clean Your Coins by Bill Groom

At some point in time, most collectors have heard some fellow collector or dealer say, "Never clean your coins!" That old adage certainly sounds like sage advice, but personally, I have to take issue with that school of thought. There are certainly a few, logical reasons that any serious coin collector might want to clean some coins. Don't get me wrong. There are good ways of cleaning that will actually conserve a coin's surface.



My favorite means of cleaning is the use of acetone. A pint or so can be purchased at any hardware store for under \$10, and it makes a good solvent to have handy for general household use. Before using any method of cleaning, a collector should practice upon a variety of low grade and/or common coins. Dunk one end of a Q-Tip into the acetone, gently pressing the damp tip against the inside of the can or bottle so as to wring it out. Then take a practice coin and gently swab one side. Alternately use the dry end of the Q-Tip to lift the acetone from the wet side. Repeat the process on both sides until no further discoloration appears on the cotton. If you see green coloration, that may be verdigris or PVC that migrated onto the coin from an old holder, coin album, box, or other, contaminated container or coin.

Once both sides have been so swabbed, don't forget to do the third surface of the coin, the edge! Otherwise, contaminants from the edge will eventually migrate to the obverse and/or reverse area. At such time that you feel comfortable, you can try conserving your collectible coins in this manner. Do be sure that all surfaces are sufficiently dry before putting them back into an album or holder.

Another, related issue here is coin storage. It's not wise to keep valuable coins, especially high-grade ones, in a damp area. Avoid the use of older albums or folders that contain sulfur and similar contaminants. Those of us who really appreciate the beauty of coins really need to take steps to preserve our prized possessions for future generations.

One final thought I'd suggest is that every collector would be wise to scrub some old coins with steel wool, pencil erasers and whatever other abrasive means are at hand. Why do I recommend this? I would hope that collectors who do this might then study the damaged surfaces so that they can better recognize coins so impaired.
