Fake Coins on eBay


Buying coins, nowadays more than ever, is risky IF a collector doesn't exercise *due diligence*. Studying coin books, joining a coin club to network with knowledgeable collectors and making purchases from reputable sources are some of the best safeguards that collectors can practice.

Many millions of coins daily change hands on eBay. To its credit, eBay does take some measures to protect buyers. Yet, the ever-increasing numbers of fakes in this venue makes it virtually impossible to police. Compounding the problem is that a large percentage of coin sellers know little or nothing about items they are selling; nor, do many care. While this scenario is beneficial to informed cherry-pickers, it's not one that benefits novices or so-called investors.

A *prime* example of this scenario unfolded on eBay just this past week. A key date, 1893-S Morgan Dollar was posted for sale. PCGS is arguably the most desired certification service for key date coins. Note that the coin in the below holder appears to be in XF or better condition, yet the holder grade is F15. To this writer, the grade disparity is a red flag, and closer inspection is warranted. There are a few markers that help distinguish genuine pieces from fake Morgans, dated 1893-S. One of them is the dentil below the "1" in the date. On genuine dollars, a dentil is centered directly below the "1" in 1893. Note that, on the below piece, the dentil is off-center – a fake alert.

Now, seeing that the coin is fake, it's only natural to suspect that the holder is fake, or else the coin within has been switched. (I personally saw a coin switch made in a PCGS holder, made twenty years ago by a collector friend who's also a pastor. He artfully inserted a Roosevelt Dime in a PCGS Morgan Dollar slab to caution coin club members.)

PCGS is such a well-respected authentication service that many collectors, and more so investors, tend to accept these slabs at face value. One way to authenticate a PCGS coin is to visit their website and verify the slab number.

Getting back to the fake coin pictured, this writer first saw it posted on the *Coin Community Forum* or *CCF* which is a free venue for collectors and dealers, alike. An astute member saw it listed on eBay and started a thread to discuss and address the problem it presented. Other members chimed in. The fake slab was outed, showing markers that rendered it a fake. Pursuant to repeated reports, eBay removed the listing; this, when bids had already exceeded \$2,200. Obviously, a number of bidders had failed to exercise *due diligence*.

Joining an online forum, like the *CCF*, is another way that collectors can exercise *due diligence*. Any member can pose questions and/or post pics of coins, tokens, etc. Other members, ranging in ability from novice to specialist will reply. Pictures help assure replies. There are tools to help with pics and many user-friendly options that help make postings easier. Participation provides endless learning about numismatics and makes it an all-around safer hobby in the process.
